Every year, millions of fake pills (also called counterfeit pills) are made to look like real prescription drugs you get from your doctor.1,2



#### Examples include<sup>2</sup>:

Hydrocodone (Vicodin®)



Benzodiazepines (Xanax®, Valium®)



Amphetamines (Adderall®)

# People are mixing fentanyl into illegal drugs with deadly results.

Half of pills tested in 2024 contained a potentially deadly dose of fentanyl.<sup>3</sup> A doctor can prescribe fentanyl to treat severe pain, especially after surgery or for advanced-stage cancer.4 However, people also make it illegally adding it to other illegal drugs to make them cheaper, more powerful, and more addictive.

#### Fentanyl makes illegal drugs more dangerous."

The scariest part about fentanyl? You can't see, smell, or taste it. 4,5 It doesn't take much to cause an overdose—just 2 milligrams of fentanyl, the amount that would fit on the tip of a pencil, can be deadly.

### A fatal overdose can happen to anyone.

If someone offers you a pill, there's no way to know what's inside or if it's really what it claims to be. It's not worth the risk.

#### Keep it real.

Only take pills that your doctor or healthcare provider prescribes to you, and always get your prescriptions from a pharmacy you trust.
