Divorces and divorce rates

More couples divorced in the United States in 1984 than in 1983, and the divorce rate rose slightly. In 1984, 1,169,000 couples divorced, about 1 percent more than the 1,158,000 couples who divorced in 1983 (table 1). The divorce rate per 1,000 total population rose from 4.9 in 1983 to 5.0 in 1984.

There was also an increase in the divorce rate when the population on which the rate is based is restricted to married omen, that is, women truly at risk of divorce. The divorce te per 1,000 married women 15 years of age and older was 21.5 in 1984, about 1 percent above the rate for 1983 (21.3). This divorce rate has exceeded 20 per 1,000 each year since 1974. Thus, over 2 percent of married women divorce annually.




Figure 1. Divorce rates: United States, 1925-84

The long-term trend in the number of divorces and the divorce rate has been upward (figure 1). Two peaks are evident for these measures. The first peak occurred in 1946, soon after World War II, when the number of divorces reached 610,000 and the divorce rate reached 4.3 per 1,000 total population (table 1). The second, higher peak occurred at the beginning of this decade. The number of divorces peaked at 1,213,000 in 1981 and the divorce rate peaked at 5.3 per 1,000 population in 1979 and 1981. Since 1981 the divorce rate has fluctuated between 4.9 and 5.0. The trend in the divorce rate per 1,000 married women 15 years and older was similar. This rate peaked at 17.9 in 1946 and reached a second peak of 22.8 in 1979.

In 1984, divorce rates were lowest in the Northeast Region and highest in the West Region (table 2). The divorce rate per 1,000 population was 3.6 in the Northeast, 4.4 in the Midwest, 5.5 in the South, and 6.0 in the West. Between 1983 and 1984 the divorce rate was unchanged in the Northeast, fell slightly in the Midwest and South, and rose in the West.

Among States, divorce rates ranged from a low of 3.0 in Massachusetts to a high of 15.2 in Nevada. In a majority of ates, divorce rates fell between 1983 and 1984. Among the 3 States and the District of Columbia which had complete

and comparable data for both years, the divorce rate fell in 27 States, rose in 9 States, and remained the same in 7 States and the District of Columbia. Vermont and Georgia reported the largest decreases. The divorce rate dropped 10 percent in Vermont (from 4.9 to 4.4), and 9 percent in Georgia (from 5.8 to 5.3). Among the nine States where the divorce rate rose, New Jersey, Kansas, and Florida reported the largest increases. The divorce rate rose 6 percent in New Jersey and Kansas, from 3.6 to 3.8 in New Jersey and from 5.0 to 5.3 in Kansas. The divorce rate rose 5 percent in Florida, from 6.6 to 6.9.

Overall, divorce rates were higher in 1984 than they had been a decade earlier. For the United States the 1984 divorce rate of 5.0 was 9 percent higher than the 1974 rate (4.6). Among the 42 reporting areas with complete and comparable data for 1974 and 1984, 30 areas had higher divorce rates in 1984, 11 had higher rates in 1974, and 1 had the same rate in both years. The West was the only region where the divorce rate was lower in 1984 than in 1974.

Data for the preceding discussion come from reports (provided annually by the 50 States and the District of Columbia) of the number of divorces. For the following discussion of children involved in divorce, ages at divorce and at marriage, and duration of marriage, detailed information on the characteristics of divorcing couples comes from the 31 States in the divorce-registration area (DRA). About 48 percent of the divorces in the United States took place in DRA States in 1984.

Children involved in divorce




Figure 2. Divorces and children involved: United States, 1950-84

Each year parents of over a million children divorce. In 1984, 1,081,000 children under 18 years of age were affected by divorce (table 3). The number of children involved in divorce has exceeded 1 million every year since 1971, peaking at 1,181,000 in 1979 (figure 2).

The average number of children per decree granted has generally been falling since 1964 when it peaked at 1.36. By

1984 this measure had fallen to 0.92 children per decree, the same average as in 1955. In contrast, the number of children involved in divorce per 1,000 children under 18 years of age continued to rise until 1981. This rate rose from 6.1 in 1951 to 18.7 in 1981 and fell back to 17.2 in 1984.

Children's involvement in divorce varied by State. The average number of children per decree ranged from 0.79 in Maryland and Tennessee to 1.22 in Vermont (table 4). The rate per 1,000 children under 18 years of age ranged from 11.8 in Maryland to 24.6 in Wyoming.

A majority of divorcing couples in the DRA had at least one child under age 18 years at the time of the decree. Twenty-six percent had one child, 20 percent had two children, and 8

percent had three or more children, while 47 percent had no children (table 5). The percent of divorcing couples with no children ranged from 37 percent in Nebraska to 52 percent in New York and Tennessee.

Age

In general, divorce rates decreased with age. In 1984 among married women in the DRA, divorce rates were highest, 45.5 per 1,000, at ages 15–19 years (table 6). Divorce rates fell steadily for each successive age group. Women age 35–39 years were only half as likely to divorce as teenage women, a women age 45–49 years were only one-quarter as likely

divorce. Among married men, the divorce rate was highest (48.2) for ages 20-24 years, even higher than the rate for teenagers (42.9). Rates fell steadily with age thereafter.

For the United States, the divorce rate for married women age 15 years and over rose from 21.3 to 21.5 between 1983 and 1984, but for the DRA, the rate dropped from 18.9 to 18.8. For men in the DRA, the rate dropped from 19.3 to 19.2 (table 6). Between 1983 and 1984 there were only minor changes, and no clear trend, in the divorce rates calculated for specific 5-year age groups. Rates fell for 11 of the age groups, stayed the same for 1 group (men age 50-54 years), and rose for the remaining 10 age groups.

The divorce rate for married men age 15 years and over was higher than for married women age 15 years and over.

This inconsistency arose because fewer men than women were reported as married in the U.S. Bureau of the Census population estimates that were used to calculate divorce rates. Thus the same number of divorces, 567,783 for the DRA in 1984, was divided by a smaller base population for men than for women.

The average age at divorce remained nearly steady for both sexes between 1974 and 1980 and then began to rise. For men the average (mean) age rose from 35.1 years in 1980 to 36.2 in 1984 (table 7). For women the average age rose from 32.4 years in 1980 to 33.6 in 1984. Between 1974 and 1984 the percent of persons divorcing at ages 30–44 years grew while the percent divorcing before age 25 years decreased. The percent of divorces granted to older couples was small and-

fluctuated very little during the decade. In both 1974 and 1984, 1.6 percent of divorcing men and 0.8 percent of divorcing women were 65 years of age and over.

The average (mean) age at which divorcing spouses had been married rose after 1980, from 25.9 to 26.7 years for men and from 23.3 to 24.1 years for women (table 8). The percent of divorces in which the husband had married while a teenager fell from 19.5 in 1974 to 14.9 in 1984; the percent of divorces in which the wife had married while a teenager fell from 43.8 in 1974 to 34.0 in 1984.

The average ages at marriage and divorce varied among States in 1984 (table 9). Men in Wyoming divorced at the youngest average age (34.4 years), and men in Massachusetts divorced at the oldest average age (37.9 years). Women in South Dakota and Wyoming divorced at the youngest average age (31.8), and women in Massachusetts divorced at the oldest average age (35.3 years). Divorcing men in South Carolina had married at the youngest average age (25.7 years) and in Idaho at the oldest average age (28.3 years). Divorcing women

had married at the youngest average age in Pennsylvania and South Carolina (23.2 years) and at the oldest average age in Oregon (25.5 years).

Duration of dissolving marriages

In 1984 divorcing couples had been married 9.5 years on average, the same average as in 1970 (table 10). Average duration fell to 9.1 years between 1970 and 1978, rose to a peak of 9.6 years in 1983, and dropped back to 9.5 years in 1984. Among DRA States in 1984, the average (mean) duration of marriage ranged from 7.3 years in Wyoming to 11.9 years in Massachusetts (table 11). The largest percent of divorces were granted to couples married 1-4 years (33.6 percent). Only 4.2 percent of the divorces in the DRA were granted within 1 year of marriage. Alabama reported the largest percent of divorces granted within 1 year of marriage (10.6 percent) while Maryland, Massachusetts, Vermont, and Virginia reported less than 1 percent.

Technical notes

Definitions

Divorces include absolute divorces, annulments, and dissolutions of marriage. Data are tabulated by State where decree was granted, not by State of residence. For the petitioner, however, State of residence is defined as State where decree was granted, regardless of usual residence. Date of divorce is defined as the date the decree was granted.

Sources of data

Nationwide counts

Data in tables 1 and 2 come from the number of divorce decrees reported annually by States and counties to the National Center for Health Statistics.

Sample data

Information about the characteristics of divorcing couples is available only from States that participate in the divorce-registration area (DRA). Data in tables 3–11 come from a probability sample of divorce records from the 31 States that paricipated in the DRA in 1984. In 1973–77, 29 States participated in the DRA; in 1978, 28 States participated; in 1979–80, 30 States participated; and in 1981–84, 31 States participated. About 48 percent of the divorces in the United States took place in DRA States in 1984.

Divorce sample

The probability sample of divorce records for 1984 was selected by using five different sampling rates. For each State in the DRA, either 5, 10, 20, 50, or 100 percent of the divorce records were included. Sampling rates were selected so that the expected sample would contain at least 2,500 records for each State. This criterion required 100 percent sampling for Alaska, Delaware, Hawaii, Montana, New Hampshire, South Dakota, and Wyoming. One hundred percent of the divorce records were included for eight additional States—Illinois, Missouri, Nebraska, New York, Rhode Island, South Carolina, Vemont, and Virginia. These States supplied State-coded data tapes of 100 percent of their divorce records through the Vital Statistics Cooperative Program.

The table on this page shows sampling errors for estimates that constitute 1, 10, 25, 50, 75, 90, and 99 percent of the annual divorce totals. These sampling errors are shown for the DRA for 1974, 1983, and 1984, and for each DRA State for 984.

Estimates of children involved in divorce

To make the national estimates of children involved in divorce, shown in table 3, it was assumed that the average number of children per decree for the United States was the same as the average in the DRA States. This average was multiplied by the national divorce total to estimate the national number of children involved in divorce. For 1950-59, the average number of children per decree was calculated using data from all reporting States; for 1960, from a nationwide sample; for 1961-69, from 16 States; and, thereafter, from all DRA States.

Computation of rates, percent distributions, medians, and means

Divorce rates for 1984 are based on populations estimated as of July 1, 1984.^{1,2} Percent distributions, means, and medians exclude cases for which the pertinent information (number of children, duration of marriage, or age) is not stated. Mean and median age at marriage and mean and median age at decree were computed using ungrouped data.
