Farm accidents result from defective equipment, improper maintenance, poor management, and human factors! This hazard checklist can help you control accidents in your own farming operation by guiding you in spotting and correcting hazards.

Every "No" answer identifies a problem which needs to be corrected. Use this checklist to promote safety with your family and employees.
