I, personally cannot make a connection, being that I am not an oncologist; but I do wonder about all the years of chemical exposure. I, also It always had a strange odor all the time. I had asthma worked very frequently in Bldg. as a child, and it also came back during my early years of working there. I don't know if this is relevant, but my husband worked for Endicott as an IBM . He was exposed to barrels of chemicals every day for years. He developed a lung problem that became quite severe and has to use breathing medications. It's quite possible that emphysema can very well be developing. I think any employee or chemical worker should also be considered in this study. I'm doing OK, but don't know what will happen down the line for us and it's scary.
