I have filled out form after form only to be misidentified, misinformed, delayed and told I do not meet the requirements set out by LAW. The answer to my pleas for help, are precluded because it is the LAW. The DOE does not deny that they caused the injury to my lungs, the DOE only denies me compensation and medical care.

Feds Eye Change in Hanford Claim Rules

Feds eye changes in Hanford claim rules

The federal government is considering new rules that may make it easier for former Hanford workers with lymphoma cancers or their survivors to receive benefits that include a \$150,000 payment.

If the rules are adopted, previously decided claims could be reconsidered. The proposed change was published Thursday in the Federal Register. Public comment will be accepted for two weeks.
